

Short Study 065 Letters to the 7 Churches 7 – Laodicea

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Read Revelation 3:14-22.

Introduction: In some ways, this is perhaps the most soul-searching of the seven letters. Faithful Philadelphia sets a high ideal to which to aspire, 'dead' Sardis flags up a warning to be avoided; 'Luke-warm' Laodicea is neither one nor the other. It challenges us to examine the strength of our commitment as followers of Christ.

1. The Sender (v14). Three descriptions of the Lord are given. Read 2 Cor 1:19-20, which gives the meaning of 'The Amen,' and consider how this contrasts with the luke-warm state of the Laodiceans (Rev 3:16). His witness is 'faithful and true', but witness to what? 'The Beginning of Creation' means originator, rather than the first to be created (see John 1:3).

2. The Church's Deficiencies (v15).

(i) They were 'luke-warm' (vs 15-16). Whatever good works they engaged in were conducted half-heartedly. They are described as 'neither hot nor cold'. Why do you think the Lord would prefer them to be 'cold' rather than luke-warm? Have a think about this, then turn to the commentators for their answers (Albert Barnes has a good answer to this.)

(ii) They were deceived (v17). Laodicia was a wealthy city. They were materially satisfied but they were blind to their spiritual paucity. Consider how material security and comfort might contribute to a lack of spiritual zeal (see Luke 18:25).

3. The Remedies (v18). The Lord offers three remedies. All three would have been familiar pictures to the Laodicians. Consult commentaries to find out why.

(i) Gold, to ease their poverty. (See 1 Pet 1:18)

(ii) Garments, to cover their nakedness. (Contrast this with Isaiah 64:6)

(iii) Eye salve, to heal their blindness. (See John 3:3)

'Buy' does not, of course, mean with money. What else does the Lord offer, for which He names His 'price'? (See Isaiah 55:1 and consider what is meant)?

4. Christ's Appeals (vs 19-20). These are made in love (v19). (See also SofS 5:2-6)
(i) *Be zealous and repent (be earnest and repent -* NIV). Is lack of zeal a sin?
(ii) *Open the door*. What does it mean to let Christ in (bearing in mind that this was addressed to those who had already professed faith in Christ)?

5. Christ's Promises (vs 21-22). Consider or find out what each of them mean.

(i) To Come in and dine with. The promise is to linger, not a quick visit.

(ii) To sit of Christ's throne. Ancient thrones were wide, with room for two.

To think about: 'Hot' in the Greek is *zestos*, from which we get the word 'zealous'. Can I be more zealous in my love and service for Christ? **To dig deeper**: Find out all you can about Laodicia in the 1st Century AD.
